



1 ELEVATED PARK

KING & CENTRE ST.

This engineering marvel of 1929 carried over 140 trains daily at its peak, making it an iconic structure of SW Ontario. Today it's home to Canada's 1st Elevated Park.

2 JUMBO MONUMENT

65 TALBOT ST.

In 1885 Jumbo the elephant was tragically struck by a train in St. Thomas. A statue was erected in tribute to the 100th anniversary of his death.



3 OLD CHURCH BELL

55 WALNUT ST.

An Ontario Heritage Site, the Old St. Thomas Church was built in 1822. In 1825, the Cotswold spire & bell tower were added featuring the bell of an old locomotive.

4 DR. GUSTIN'S HOME

295 TALBOT ST.

This last remaining Victorian residence on Talbot West was the house of E.W. Gustin, the company doctor for the Great Western Railway and Mayor of St. Thomas in 1883.



5 PERSEVERANCE

WELLINGTON & SUNSET

Found in the gateway roundabout on Sunset, enjoy this epic sculptural ode to the railway from a viewing platform off Sunset. Created by local artist Scott McKay.

6 TRESTLE BRIDGE

87 ST. GEORGE ST.

Originally a wooden structure the CN Trestle was built by the Great Western Rail in 1871-72. In the 1890s it was replaced by the current steel trestle.

7 WABASH YARDS

END OF HIAWATHA ST.

This was once the site of the Wabash Station, where the Wabash and L&PS railway lines met. The station was built in 1897 and demolished in 1967.



8 L&PS STATION

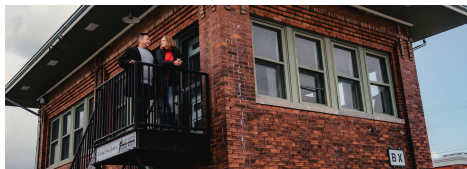
605 TALBOT ST.

A replica of the original station for the London & Port Stanley rail route which carried thousands of trains for 59 years. Now home to the office of Railway City Tourism.

9 ENGINEER'S BUILDING

561-567 TALBOT ST.

The former Engineer's Building was the headquarters of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. It was designed by Neil Darrach and officially opened in November 1909.



10 BX TOWER

CENTRE & MOORE ST.

In 1887, two trains collided, exploding the freight's oil and starting an intense fire. To reduce rail collisions the BX Tower was built in 1910.

11 CENTRAL UNITED CHURCH

135 WELLINGTON ST.

When building the 1874 church, the congregation met at CASO Station, earning the name Railwaymen's Church. Current stained glass features rail scenes.



12 OLD YMCA

672 TALBOT ST.

In 1914 a building was built & operated as the Railway City YMCA. Its cornerstone was laid by the Duke of Connaught Governor-General of Canada.

13 CASO STATION

750 TALBOT ST.

CASO Station now serves as a symbol of St. Thomas' rail heritage. Visit the North American Railway Hall of Fame here.



14 RAILWAY MUSEUM

225 WELLINGTON ST.

Experience the inner workings of a locomotive repair shop and see historic trains & artifacts in this 1913 shop - the longest running in North America.

15 JUMBO PLAQUE

WOODWORTH AVE. AT TRACKS

The site where on September 15th 1885, Jumbo was tragically struck by a train while being led to his boxcar after a circus performance.

16 STREET RAILWAY

WILSON AVE.

This boulevard once held St. Thomas' street railway which evolved from horse-drawn vehicles to electric street cars in 1898.

17 CEMETERY MONUMENTS

67 WEST AVE.

Find 3 tombstones with locomotives carved into them, a testament to the railway's local impact. Plus find the grave of the engineer who hit Jumbo.

18 RAILWAY MURALS

VARIOUS LOCATIONS

Find historic murals outlining the history of the rail in St. Thomas, or contemporary murals on buildings and boxcars celebrating this history.

POINTS OF INTEREST

A Whistlestop Trail

605 TALBOT ST.

Ride, run, or roam through lush trails from the Railway City to Port Stanley, where the path meets Sunset Drive and the Terminal Rail.

B Railway 1856 Mini Golf

417 WELLINGTON ST.

This indoor mini-golf course is themed entirely after the railway in St. Thomas! Play a round and learn some history.

C Pinafore Park

95 ELM ST.

Visit century old pavilions nestled among towering trees, or visit the historic pond that used to supply the steam railway.

D Railway City Brewing

130 EDWARD ST.

Visit a local craft brewery that takes inspiration in its brews from St. Thomas' railway heritage.

E Streamliners Espresso Bar

767 TALBOT ST.

Visit this rail themed espresso bar! Get coffee roasted across the street at the CASO Station by Las Chicas Del Cafe.

F Public Art Centre

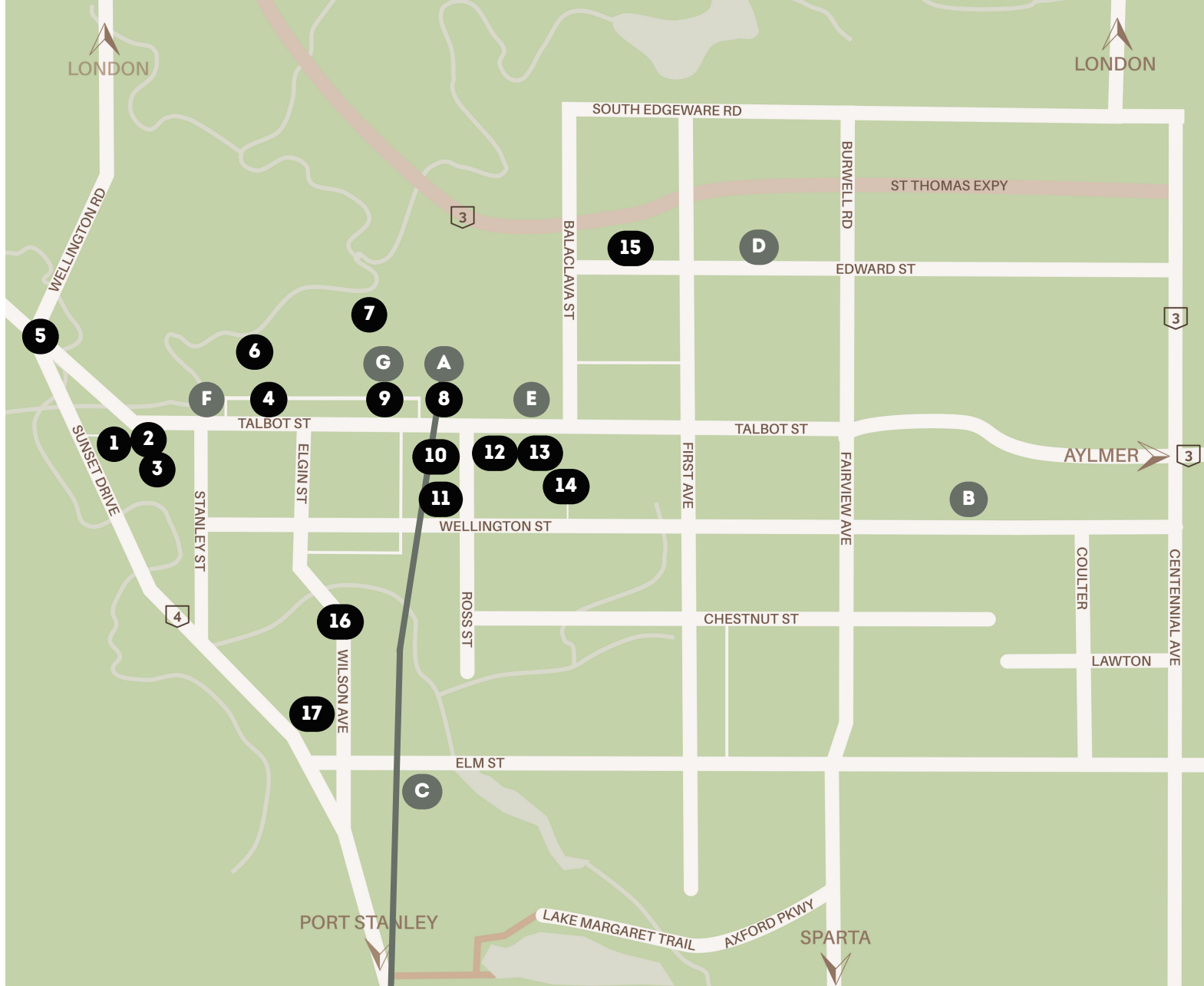
301 TALBOT ST.
