



Built in 1879 by Drs. Duncan and Colin McLarty, has a strong Scot baronial influence of architecture and includes Mason's insignia on the third floor.

more organizations.



Built as an extension of the Hay/Turner Block. Built by H. Lindop.



Built in 1885, this strip of buildings was home to Brodrick dry goods, Pentecostal Assembly hall, Real estate firms and other various companies. Its current land use is loft apartments.



Built from 1880 to 1885, this building was the home of Mrs. James McCrone Dressmakers, Miss McAlpine Dressmakers, H.H. Way Dentist, FT. Chapman Books and Binder and Shaw's Fancy Good and Variety. Notably, its neighbour was McLanlin's Books (owner of the weekly home journal).



Built in 1891, was Provincial Provident Institute, George T. Claris Brokers and The Municipal World. 360 Talbot Street was built in 1905 and included Misses Crandell Dressmakers, Robert Housley Broker and Andrew Clarke Real Estate.



This corner was built from 1883 to 1905, and was the home of Pinecombe Butcher Shop with the brothers residency up top. It later expanded into Real Estate as well. Located next door was the Carriage Trimming Shop, Wagon Shop and Blacksmith, William Copeman Carriages, London Free Press and Huron and Erie Loans. Lastly, the corner expanded one last time in 1905 to accommodate Youman's Insurances and Isaac Cassis Fruits.

Built in 1886, third floor removed, second floor facade altered, Samuel Goodwin Furniture, W.B. Jennings, Kerr & Company Undertakers, Merchants Bank of Canada, Canada Wood Products, Prudential Collection Agency, Bank of Montreal.



Anderson's Dept Store (The Anderson Company), remnants of the building date to 1871 as the Haggert Brothers Foundry and Metal Works, Anderson's moved in 1902, building altered and expanded over the years.





Built in 1885, was Balmoral Hotel, Moody & Clark Provisionals, and Hepinstall's Jewellery.



Built in 1905, heavily renovated in early 1970s. Adjacent properties 446-448 were home to Charlie Wong Chinese Laundry which closed in 1959. In 1967 the properties, along with 450 Talbot, were converted to Hepburn Parkette.



Built in 1885. The original owner was Squire Frank Hunt.



447-449 built in 1882 for Squire Frank Hunt. 451-453 built in 1894 by Dr. Tyrell Duncombe, housed the Duncombe Opera House with seating for 790, later known as Bennett's Vaudeville Theatre, massive fires in 1907 and 1935, remodelled in 1990 to house Canada Manpower. Shops included: Tyrell Duncombe Drugs, James Hales' Butcher Shop, Waddell Brothers groceries, F.W. Woolworth Company in 1915, Strand Bowling and Billiards.





Built in 1894 to house the Free Library, replacing the Mechanics Institute, also housed: Dr. T.H. Duncombe, Penhale Real Estate, G. Geddes Insurance, various law and financial offices.



492 Talbot Street was Free Library, P.R. Williams Funderal Directors, James Crawford Cigars, St. Thomas Liberal Club, Young and Morton Insurances, Edith Cavell Hall.

494-496 Talbot Street was Free Library, Logan and Watling Cleaners, L. Parker Barbershop, Ferguson (Fergie's) Barbershop, and Mortin Locke Insurances.



This was the original site of Adcock Mills, Flour & Feed and Brewsters Fancy Goods. There was two fires 1915 and 1933. 485 Talbot St., second floor home to Hamilton Stott Plumbers, Canadian Legion Hall, Veterans Association, IODE Toron House, P.R. Locke Insurance and Real Estate. 487 second floor, 491-495 Talbot St. was built in 1902 to house Dowler Brothers Clothing Store and Drygoods, It was originally three storeys, with third floor mansard roof. Fire in 1905 removed third floor. 495 Talbot St. was built in 1915. Housed W.E. Maxwell Dry Goods, A&P Food Store, Easton Grocery Store, T. Eaton's Order Office, Reitman's Ladies Wear.




Built in 1919 as Joseph McAlpine Piano, home to Dundas Ladies' Wear, Bougher and Son China Hall.

Built in 1910 as Porter & Nelson Jewellers, housed Bair's Confections, Sanders and Holcombe Confections Anthony's Music Store, Reid's Paint Service and Kid's Cents.

529-531 Talbot Street



Built in 1910 as Roberst and Sandham Electrical contractors, housed Frederick Ruston Electrical (1930), Imperial System of Baking (1935-1975), and Elite Fashions.

535-539 Talbot Street



533-535 Talbot St. was built in 1900 as Wm. Barrett Barbershop, housed Robbins Cigars & Billiards, continuing as tobacconist and billiards to 1990, On Track offices (1995), and Rogers Cablecast (2000). 537-539 Talbot St. was built in 1895 as Columbia Hotel, housed Columbia Theatre (1920-1960), Clinton's Flower Shop, Columbia Apartments and Castle Hair.



St. Thomas City Hall, designed 1898-1899 by Neil R. Darrach, is an outstanding example of a city hall designed in the late Richardsonian Romanesque. The compact massing of the buff-coloured brick and Ohio sandstone building is effectively broken by the prominent, asymmetrically placed clock tower. Single and clustered windows (both square and round arch headed), wall dormers with side turrets, emphatic string courses, and a boldly articulated modillion cornice in metal further enliven the multiple hipped roofed structure. Sandstone entranceway on bot the south and west elevations feature massive arches that open onto recessed double leaf entrance doors. Balconies with pierced balustrades and turrets complete the entranceways. The tower is distinguished by turrets, gables with clock faces, and a polygonal roof. The roofs of both the tower and the main building are covered with dark grey slate.



Built in 1901, housed succession of dry goods and clothiers on first floor including A.E. Dunlop Clothiers, J.W. Pomer Dry Goods, Wendell Holmes Bookstore, Penhale Booths and Shoes, succession of Law offices, Chamber of Commerce.



Built in 1908, housed numerous doctors, dentists, osteopaths on upper floor with Steel Optical on ground floor several decades. Housed Buckell & Vansickle Butchers, Antoinette Hat Shoppe Hat Shoppe, A&P Grocers, Meyer's Photo Studio, Singer Sewing Centre, Toth Jeweller (1980).



Opened Nov 3, 1909, designed by Neil Darrach, second floor contained a banqueting and dance hall seating 750 people. Third floor housed Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and the Free Mason's Hall. First building to be heated by steam supplied by St. Thomas Electric Light Works. Third floor and massive cornice removed after major 1951 fire.

Built in 1910, originally Steel and Company Fruits, Abdelh Fruits, Charles Shapcott Meats, M. Kroll Tires and a succession of retails and services.

571-579 Talbot Street



First two bays built in 1874, final bay in 1882. Third floor originally a mansard roof with dormers. All three builds show a common facade in period show a common facade in period photos. All buildings had a succession of retail establishments including George Watson Publisher & Bookstore, Manley's Bookstore & Stationary, Baronet Shoes, A.S. Smith Fine Wines, Loblaw's Grocery.

574-584 Talbot Street



Built in 1905 as Imperial Bank. Corner unit, 584, occupied by Imperial Bank of Canada, Imperial Bank of Commerce until 1980. Other bays in the block housed Prudential Insurance, Southern Ontario gas, George Ferguson Insurances, London and Lake Erie Railway. London Free Press located at 578 Talbot Street.

581-583 Talbot Street




Built in 1880 as two separate buildings. 581 Talbot Street housed Cronk Furniture Store, William McCully Furniture, Thomas Johnston Grocer and Stirling Clothiers (1910-1960). 583 Talbot Street housed Charles Begg Furniture, Thomas Scott Photography Gallery (1880-1985).

587-589 Talbot Street



587 Talbot Street built in 1900, housed McMurtry's Hardware and Bicycles, S. Wong Cafe (1905), Dominion Cafe (1905), George Assallay Candies, and M. Barrie Fruits. 589 Talbot Street built in 1881, housed McMurtry Hardware, Pete Peters Butcher, Olympia Candy Company, Home Dairy Bary (1925-1960), Kar-Leen Beauty Lounge, Kar-Leen Apartments.





Built in 1910, the Southerland Press Building is reminiscent in construction to the present Victoria Building at the east corner of Stanley and Talbot Street on the west end of the city. Tenants included: Noble Mfg. (biscuit maker, Nobility Chocolates, and later Southerland Press Company.



Built in 1945, The first tenant included Peterson Motors Sales. Later tenants included a variety of bus/transit tenants including: Greyhound, St. Thomas Coach Lines, Charterways Bus Lines, and later the St. Thomas Transit Terminal and St. Thomas Transit Services.



The Acadia Block was built in 1881 for William Idsardi. The building housed a variety of tenants, including: tailor shops, men's clothing stores, shoe repair shops, The Robert Harris Jewellers, The Ontario Ministry of Transportation and the Motor Vehicle Licence Office.




Built between 1873 and 1874 the 3 building bays form the remaining Smith Blocks. Tenants in the buildings have included: Smith Hardware Store, Geo., Smiley Hardware Store, Exclusive Ladies Wear, Eigin Outfitters, St Thomas News Depot and the Beanery Restaurant.



Built in 1895 for Dr. Wm. E. Smith, who later partnered with Dr. J. D. Curtis. Dr. Smith was named the Railway Hospital Association Doctor. Tenants have included William Cornforth Bookstore, McDonald and Company, Jacob Robinson Clothing, Ashbury's Men's Shop, Bob's Barbershop and Ansell's Trophies. These stores have occupied the building since its inception.

The St. Thomas CASO station was built between June 1871 and April 1873. Designed by the Canadian architect Edgar Berryman (1839-1905), the building was the largest of 31 Canada Southern Railway stations built in the 1870's. The station housed the corporate headquarters of the CSR as well as being the town's passenger station. It was constructed using 400,000 buff coloured bricks that were manufactured at brickyards in nearby Yarmouth Township. These bricks were later tinted red using a rouging technique. Now that it has been restored it is owned by the North American Railway Hall of Fame.




